Tony Jennings – A personal note

It is with much sadness that I write this report. As many of you will know by now, Tony Jennings who ran the Woodyard, died on 30th May following a short illness. Tony was a very dear friend to me and it was due to him that I joined the Parish Council when he stepped down after serving thirty years as a councillor. For the last ten years Tony has been my sounding board on all matters village related and has always offered good advice and anecdotes about previous administrations. Having lived and worked in Moulton from an early age there was very little that he didn't know about village life.

He was a true gentleman in every sense of the word and I consider it a great privilege to have known and worked with him. He often told me that he didn't know many people in the village but I am sure most of you knew him. His gentle smile and the sight and sound of his tractor and trailer full of logs was part of the fabric of our community.



I will miss him very much.

Council News

<u>Speed Indicator device</u> This equipment was purchased on a 50/50 shared basis with Gazeley Parish Council. However it has proved so effective that both councils have come to the conclusion that we need our own devices. The data recorded is passed on to the Police enforcement team so that they can target offenders. Be aware and keep below the speed limit through the village.

<u>Play Equipment</u> The Parish Council have placed the order for a replacement for the see-saw which should be installed in July. We are also raising funds for an arial ropeway to run across the bottom end of the recreation ground.

<u>Boundary Change</u> Our parish boundary will almost certainly change in the next year and we will lose the income from the 150 homes in Kentford End. However, with the continued help of our wonderful volunteer army we can continue to keep the village in its wonderful state at no extra costs.

<u>Flower beds and troughs</u> It is lovely to hear all the positive comments about the village flowers but they do take a lot of work to keep them looking nice. The main problem is keeping the plants watered especially through the warm summer months. Please consider adopting your nearest flower bed or box/trough. If. you can help, even maybe once or twice a week please let Dorothy Bowes know. All help will be very much appreciated and will keep the village colourful. Dorothy's number is 750362.

St Peters Church News

Our improved facilities at church have continued to be admired especially for gatherings at funerals, baptisms and weddings. It is one year ago that the contractors began the project and you will recall Reverend Canon Stephen Mitchell formally 'opened' the new glass tower door on September 7th to reveal the small kitchen and the adjacent toilet.

You may remember one of the first groups able to use these were the 'Bikers and Striders' last September. The **Suffolk Historic Churches Trust** hold

* an annual event to encourage people to gain sponsorship and then cycle or stride

* to as many Suffolk Churches between

* the hours of 9am and 5pm on Saturday 9th September 2017.

Our PCC have agreed to keep church open and staffed that day, and to provide refreshments for the participants.

During last year the Trust gave a total of £200,000 to Suffolk Churches. Their 50/50 funding enabled us to install the new Roof Alarm early in January, so we are more than pleased to be supporting their event again. Churchyard Matters

Over recent years Bob Saltmarsh has spent a considerable amount of time working to establish and maintain the conservation project within both the old and the new churchyard. The notices alongside the path explain that in conjunction with Suffolk Wildlife Trust, the churchyard has areas set aside to create a naturally beautiful environment that includes several landscapes. The Trust fully supports this endeavour as some of the species of flowers and grasses are unique to this part of Suffolk, and the seeds collected can be taken to other sites for propagation. We also arrange for a contractor to regularly cut the grass and strim certain areas. The mowers and strimmers used need to pass freely over the grass and not be impeded by edging, objects, or stones that damage equipment that then requires expensive repair.

The churchyard should be a naturally beautiful environment for everyone. It is of concern to our PCC that the churchyard does not always reflect this. May we take this opportunity to bring to your attention again that it is the responsibility of families to remove old wreaths, unsightly old flowers, dead plants and superfluous vases. The accumulation of old discarded water bottles, containers and planters make an unattractive feature. To this end we have recently begun to clear those items that appear to be neglected. If you have any thoughts or suggestions as to how we can improve the overall appearance of our churchyard please tell our churchwardens. Thank you.

We have applied for planning permission to extend the graveyard into the area below the graveyard which is in use at present. Once planning permission is gained we will need to have the area consecrated by a Bishop. This is now necessary as we are quickly running out of space in the existing area. There will be some landscaping and fence building to be done and to build

some steps to give access from the new area to the existing area giving a new and an easier route to the graves that are lower down in the existing graveyard.

Now that summer is nearly upon us it is nearly time for three important dates in our calendar. The first being our annual **'Rock in the Meadow'** on Saturday July 1st, Posters etc will soon adorn the Telegraph poles and roadsides. Secondly our annual **strimming party** of the old graveyard will be on Saturday 17th June at 9.00am all are welcome to join us please bring petrol strimmers with you though we do have some spare ones. Thirdly on Tuesday 4th July the **Moulton Community Choir** will be giving their annual concert in the Church. The evening starts at 7.00pm this is a very enjoyable event, with a bar and small buffet.

A reminder of dates of services at St Peter's, our regular services are a Family service on the first Sunday of the month and a Communion service on the third Sunday of the month, both services start at 10.30am. All are very welcome.

In addition there are the following services in the Benefice;

Higham has a Communion service on the first Sunday of the Month at 9.15am

Gazeley has a Communion service on second Sunday of the month at 10.30am and 'Morning Praise for All' service on the fourth Sunday of the month at 10.30am.

Dalham has Communion services on the second and fourth Sundays of the month at 9.00am.

Kentford has an Evensong service on the first Sunday of the month at 6.00pm and a Communion service on the third Sunday at 6pm.

However, this normal pattern changes when there are single Benefice services. Over the next four months they are as follows;

18th June Communion service at Kentford at 10.30am

30th July Communion service at **Higham** at 10.30am.

20th August Communion service at $\ensuremath{\textbf{Moulton}}$ at 10.30am. (our usual day and time, but for the whole benefice)

10th September Communion service at **Gazeley** at 10.30am

At present it is still approximately 36p a litre but I am hoping the demand for oil will drop when the weather improves which should result in a lower price.

Report by David White Visitor Experience Officer, RSPB Lakenheath Fen

The dragon's lair

If you have visited RSPB Lakenheath Fen over the last couple of years, you may have seen the three raised plant beds on the lawn in front of the visitor centre. Just in case you haven't, they each follow a separate theme. One is full of sand loving Brecks plants, one is full of peat loving Fens plants and one is full of water loving aquatic plants. For the purposes of this article, I am going to focus on the one that is full of water loving aquatic plants.

This bed is full of a range of aquatic plants and beasties and it really came to prominence this time last year. For a couple of weeks, we were fortunate enough to witness several dragonflies and damselflies emerging from its depths. It was fascinating the witness this alien like metamorphosis and I will dedicate the rest of this article to this incredible phenomenon.

If you are not familiar with the life cycles of dragonflies and damselflies, it starts when the female lays eggs in the water. The eggs hatch as nymphs which live a predatory life underwater for up to two years. When the nymphs are ready to emerge, they climb out of the water via the aquatic vegetation. The adult insect then emerges out of the nymph's protective casing by doing a graceful cartwheel type manoeuvre. The nymph's exoskeleton (or exuvia) is then left behind as the adult insect spreads its wing for the first time to harden in the warmth of the sunshine. Although it varies from species to species, this process tends to take a couple of hours to complete.

Once the adult dragonfly or damselfly has hardened, it then makes its maiden flight voyage. Sadly, after all of that effort, the often dazzling adult insects only tend to live for around two weeks. In this time, they have to find a mate, mate and the females have to lay their eggs in the reserve pools. Talk about a busy life!

If you would like to come and see dragonflies and damselflies emerging here at Lakenheath Fen for yourselves, try and pick a sunny day. Although it is a notoriously unpredictable phenomenon, most species tend to emerge between mid-morning and mid-afternoon, when the sun is at its highest in the sky. Don't forget to bring your camera, as it can be a really photogenic process. Katherine, one of our Wardens managed to photograph an emperor dragonfly emerging last year and her photos made it into several newspapers!

The reserve is open at all times. The visitor centre and toilets are open daily 9am-5pm.

RSPB members visit for free and there is facilities charge of $\pounds 4$ per car for non-members. We hope to see you soon!

Would you like to work with animals?

Our Open Day last Saturday at Ash Tree Vets attracted several hundred visitors, including lots of children who practiced putting bandages on dogs and performing (pretend!) operations. One of the most common questions we were asked by the kids was 'How do you become a vet?' The quick answer is that you work very hard and listen to your teachers! Training to become a vet normally starts at about the age of 13 or 14 when interested kids start getting experience working with animals,



whether this be helping out on a farm, boarding kennels, pet shops, riding stables, catteries etc etc. A grade Science A-levels are then usually required to obtain a place at university where you will study for 5 or 6 years before graduating as a vet. The strongest advice we can offer any interested children, is that a being a vet isn't just about 'working with animals', we spend an awful lot of the day working with people, so you have to like them too! Other jobs you could consider if you wanted to work with animals might include veterinary nursing, zoo keeper, farmer, RSPCA, animal trainer, riding instructor, marine biologist, working with search and rescue dogs or working with assistance dogs.
